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

## LEADING CHANGE. TRANSFORMING COMMUNITIES.

The Junior League of Cedar Rapids (JLCR) is made up of more than 200 active and sustaining members. We are passionate, dedicated and innovative women volunteering to make a difference in our communities. As a 501(c)3 organization that is part of the Association of Junior Leagues International (AJIL), we abide by our mission as a group of "women whose mission is to advance women's leadership for meaningful community impact through volunteer action, collaboration, and training. Our purpose is exclusively educational and charitable." We focus on volunteer work, professional networking and training, and furthering issues of diversity and equality. The JLCR is open to all women at least 21 years of age.

Thank you for your continued support of the Junior League of Cedar Rapids. This year our league theme was Joy and Connection. After two years of virtual meetings and postponed events, we were eager to spend time together all while making an impact in the community. While there were a couple of virtual meetings and pivots along the way, by the Annual Meeting in May, we could hear the hum that only a Junior League meeting can create. We enjoyed each other's company and celebrated our wins for the year!

Our membership team focused on offering a robust variety of training and development opportunities. Training and development ranged from financial literacy and leadership to yoga and setting boundaries. On a couple of occasions, Past Presidents offered their time and shared lessons learned from their time in league. We loved hearing about their experiences and were able to draw some meaningful takeaways from their days in leadership. These opportunities helped us keep Junior League's mission to develop and train women at the forefront of our work.

We brought back Fostering Strength in the spring after two years off. The event committee worked tirelessly amidst the everchanging public health and safety recommendations. We were so grateful to have Janiva Magness join us as our guest speaker. Her raw and honest explanation of the foster care system was moving and helped us raise over \$10,875 in donations the day of our event. We can't wait to host this event again in the spring of 2023.

Bridging the G.A.P. continues to thrive as our league project. This is the longest JLCR has worked on a single project. We make an impact through the Apartment in a Suitcase Project, our scholarship program, and the Housing First Program. Collectively, this project is supporting over 150 young adults annually who have either aged out of the Iowa foster care system or are active in the foster care system.

Most importantly, we had a large incoming cohort of new league members. It is truly inspirational to see our different committees integrate new members into the fold, leverage their strengths, and connect them with meaningful relationships and training opportunities. Junior League continues to be the premiere leadership organization for women and our incoming leadership and members only reinforce the positive impact we will continue to have in the community.



Junior League of Cedar Rapids has made it our ongoing focus to support young people aging out of foster care in Linn and surrounding counties through the Bridging the G.A.P. (Guide, Advocate, Provide) project. Young people aging out of foster care often lack traditional support, including financial knowledge and resources, housing, life skills, and more. By partnering with community agencies and leveraging JLCR efforts, we are able to impact many young people who otherwise may "fall between the cracks" in our communities.

#### **BRIDGING THE G.A.P.**

# GUIDE

The Project Guide initiative focuses on providing social-emotional and life skills support for youth currently in foster care or who have aged out of foster care. We partner with Foundation 2 Crisis Services and the Achieving Maximum Potential (AMP) group in Cedar Rapids to provide meals and program support at their bi-weekly meetings. It is an opportunity to provide a healthy home-cooked meal for youth and a chance to interact with them before/during the meal. Youth also participate in life-skills lessons and peer support activities to help them process emotions and experiences, and prepare them for independent living.



Last year, members served

280

meals to AMP youth.

Because of JLCR, the Cedar Rapids-based group is the only one in Iowa that receives a meal at each meeting. Unfortunately, many AMP meetings were virtual this year due to the ongoing pandemic. Meals could not be provided at these meetings. Those held in person also had lower attendance causing the total numbers served to be much lower than past years.

## **ADVOCATE**

The Project Advocate initiative focuses on supporting youth in foster care from a policy and advocacy standpoint. As we continue to learn more about the issues and barriers facing youth in / aging out of the foster care system, we are able to better speak to their needs. Our goal is to advocate for them to receive fair care, access to resources, and more. Advocacy efforts include hosting speakers and events, and sharing resources with local partners to continue to learn more about the current environment, and what the youth we serve might be facing.

Annually, JLCR travels to the Iowa state capitol to speak with lawmakers on the challenges youth in foster care face. We also held letter-writing campaigns to local legislation, highlighted Foster Care/Adoption success stories with our Gallery of Strength campaign, and continue to highlight statistics and information on foster care in our social media campaigns. Ongoing pandemic challenges limited in-person opportunities for advocacy this year, but we are hoping to ramp up again in the future.

# PROVIDE

The Project Provide initiative focuses on providing both funds and physical items youth need as they start to establish their independence. Apartment basics, housing deposits, books and school supplies for education, and more. These are often items that young adults get from their support network and can be expensive to purchase all at once. Many youth aging out of care lack this support and starting out on their own can be extremely challenging.

## **APARTMENT IN A SUITCASE**

JLCR has pioneered the "Apartment in a Suitcase". Providing each teen aging out with a suitcase full of necessary basics needed for independent living. The "suitcase" has now expanded to include a plastic tub and laundry basket of items. "Suitcases" are provided at no cost to young adults aging out of foster care and include everything from cleaning supplies to bedsheets to pots and pans.

JLCR has also started providing baby packs for new parents as well as refresher packs to replenish some of the items in the suitcases once they are used.

## HOUSING FIRST PROJECT

Since 2018, the JLCR Housing First Project has provided one year of rent assistance for a select number of teens and young adults who have aged out of foster care in Cedar Rapids. Working with the Foundation 2 Crisis Services Independent Living Program, JLCR pays 100 percent of participant rent to start, reducing the financial support by one-third at six and nine months. During this time, the young adults work with a support network to learn about budgeting and life skills, with the goal that they will be more financially stable after the full year of assisted housing through JLCR and hopefully have their own emergency fund started.

## JLCR SCHOLARSHIP FUND

We know that young adults often incur unplanned expenses - from car repairs to housing deposits to books for school. These expenses can easily derail their tight budgets. Without a safety net of friends & family or financial knowledge to fall back on, youth who have aged out of foster care can quickly face homelessness and other risks. The JLCR Scholarship Fund offers needs-based scholarships for these various expenses. More than \$9,100 in scholarships were granted this fiscto youth in Cedar Rapids and surrounding communities.

# **MEMBERSHIP TRAINING**

One of the pillars of JLCR is the opportunity to diversify members' professional and community experience through various high-quality and meaningful training workshops and conferences.

JLCR provides financial support to help members attend local and national trainings that may otherwise be unattainable. Despite the Covid challenges this year, JLCR provided training to members in a variety of ways.

- Virtual "Lunch and Learns" were hosted monthly covering a wide range of topics like How to Project Manage Your Life, Financial Wellness, and Telling Your Story Through Your Resume.
- A variety of Cedar Rapids community training opportunities such as Pure Barre Yoga sessions, Women Lead Change, and the United Way of East Central Iowa BOLD program.
- JLCR Sustainer Talks Past active members attended membership meetings to talk about past projects and the history of JLCR and some of the challenges they tackled in past years.
- National Association of Junior League (AJLI) fall and spring conferences.

JLCR has also expressed our firm commitment to the ongoing pursuit of diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB). Discussions and socials are held each month to discuss many issues related to this important initiative. Just a few of the topics/training included:

## STUFF THE TRUCK

Stuff the Truck was another fundraiser held this year by JLCR on Giving Tuesday (November 30th). Partnering with Foundation 2, JLCR secured a truck rental donation and then used it to literally stuff with community donations. Items requested help fill JLCR suitcases for the youth aging out of care. Our members staffed the truck parked at Craft'd in downtown Cedar Rapids. The visibility of the truck (and the event itself) helped bring awareness to JLCR and its project as well as raising many inkind and monetary donations. Dish sponges, toilet paper, bed sheets, and even trash bags were donated. Plus, to help increase their impact, both JLCR and Foundation 2 had matching sponsor donations from Van Meter and CellSite. At the end of the day, the event had raised \$9,878 worth of monetary and in-kind donations.

## FOSTERING STRENGTH

After a 2 year hiatus, JLCR was extremely excited to once again host our annual fundraiser/advocacy luncheon Fostering Strength on May 19th. The annual luncheon brings together hundreds of Cedar Rapids-area community partners, foster care and adoption professionals, JLCR donors, members, and more for an afternoon of impactful stories of hope and perseverance through difficult times.

This year JLCR was honored to welcome Grammy-nominated jazz artist and foster care alumni and advocate,

Janiva Magness, to share her journey through domestic abuse, foster care, addiction and the saving grace of music.

A total of 230 tickets were sold and over \$32,000 raised this year and plans are already in the works for 2023.
